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Data Walk

Nothing will kill the energy and engagement of a meeting faster than a presentation of statistics and data. Many people lose track and it is hard for people to engage or apply what they are hearing. A data walk is a way to review, analyze, and make shared meaning of data in a far more inclusive and engaging way.

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Creating a data walk involves gathering information from various sources, including official data, reports from agencies, and each individual's (or their organization's) intended beneficiaries, their lived experience, and the data and information that members help to create. The key is to have a mix of data and information that is both academically rigorous and meaningful to the community. You gather information that is both meaningful and has a bearing on the community. You don't need to have all available data, but you do need to have a good understanding of the data and the meaning behind it. Be clear about the results for our meeting. The data should ground participants in a shared understanding and create a common starting point for planning. The process itself can build community through conversations and community building.

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
